



Pupils follow two courses in English.

# Literature and Language. The English Language Exam has 3 Units and is untiered:

# Unit 1: Oracy: Non-examination assessment 20%

What is this?

Task I (10%) – Individual Researched Presentation (40 marks)

One individual, researched presentation, which may include responses to questions and feedback, based on WJEC set themes. This activity gives candidates an opportunity to convey information and demonstrate verbal Reasoning. **September 20th - September 22nd.** 

Task 2 (10%) - Group presentation. (40 marks)

One group discussion based on a theme decided by WJEC. (TBC)

January 2023

Unit I is a compulsory element and pupils have to complete the task.

### **Unit 2:**

Pupils will sit this paper at the end of Year 11. It is two hours long and worth 40% of the GCSE.

There are 5 reading texts with questions worth 40 marks. The skills tested include; summary, retrieving information, inference and deduction, verbal reasoning, comparison of texts and synthesis.



#### **Unit 2 Continued:**

The writing section is based on an extended piece of writing (between 350-500 words) where half the marks are awarded for sentence structure, spelling and punctuation.



### **Unit 3:**

Pupils will sit this paper at the end of Year 11. It is two hours long and worth 40% of the GCSE.

There are 5 reading texts with questions worth 40 marks. The skills tested include; summary, retrieving information, inference and deduction, verbal reasoning, comparison of texts and synthesis.



#### **Unit 3 writing:**

This section includes two extended writing tasks (200 – 300 words ).


Again, half the marks awarded are for sentence structure, spelling and punctuation.

Timing is very important in this exam as there is so much writing.



#### Be Aware:

The examiner will highlight or underline EVERY mistake made in sentence structure, spelling and punctuation before awarding a mark.



#### **Key Dates:**

Oracy (speaking and listening) carried out during Year 11. September and January.

Poetry Controlled Assessment to be completed in class in October.

Shakespeare Controlled Assessment to be completed in class in January.

#### **English Key to Success**

Written tasks are marked for accuracy 50% of the marks are for sentence structure, spelling and punctuation.

We have an intervention programme during the school day to support pupils' progress.

The intervention team run drop in sessions after school for all pupils.

There will be Literature revision sessions after school half term 2.



The length of the sides of each small wire square shown is 3.3 cm.




#### Exam Structure

#### Three Tiers of Entry

Higher  $A^*, A, B, C, U$ 

Intermediate B, C, D, E, U

Foundation D, E, F, G, U

- Decisions about tier of entry are made based on assessment results.
- Tier of entry can be different for Maths and Numeracy.
- Grade boundaries for each qualification are different. They change year on year - they are not fixed.
- Exams are available to sit in November and May.



## **Skills Challenge Certificate**

This year as a result of the changes made during the pandemic there are only 2 challenges that make up the Skills Challenge Certificate instead of 3. These are:

- Global Citizenship Challenge
- Enterprise and Employability Challenge

In addition to this pupils will also undertake an Individual Project which will be linked to their career/future aspirations.

These will combine to give a grade for the Skills Challenge Certificate.

Alongside Maths and English and their other GCSE qualifications pupils will also be awarded a Pass or Fail for the Welsh Baccalaureate Qualification.

# Skills Challenge Certificate: Amended Delivery Plan

In Year 10: Enterprise and Employability Challenge 25% - Completed. Results were issued in August 2022.

Global Citizenship Challenge: 25% (Started in Year 10 Task 1, Task 2 will need to be completed early in Year 11). Year 11: Individual Project: 50%

- July Learners in year 11 will experience a 6th form transition and subject taster day to have experience of the 6th form subjects and information about the 6th Form

   Numeracy plus 3 others at C or above


